## PHYSICAL THERAPY FACILITY RENOVATIONS

### EDUCATION

#### Three Classrooms

Spacious new classrooms on the first, second, and sixth floors provide flexible space where students receive hands-on training. These facility additions enable WUPT to educate 10% more students per year.

### PATIENT CARE

#### 3,330 Square Feet of Clinical Space

A major addition of clinical space allows WUPT to double the size of its patient care practice. WUPT will now be able to hire additional personnel and serve more patients while continuing to provide each patient with individual attention and personalized care.

### RESEARCH

#### Six Laboratories

With the addition of classroom and clinical spaces, areas previously devoted to education and patient care are now available for research use. This strategic re-purposing allows laboratories previously located throughout the building to be consolidated in one location, fostering collaboration among lab personnel. The added laboratory space also enables WUPT to hire additional faculty.
